The title of proposed project → **CHURCH STREET WALK**

"The subjective analysis, mental reaction, to the neighbourhood behaviours related to the geographic location. A chronological process based on the order of appearance of observed topics, with the time delayed inclusion of other relevant instances. Reflexivity journals will be produced after this event".

This walk is around 3.5 km long and it will take approximately 2 hours to perform. There will be a group of people invited from the St. Lawrence neighbourhood group, Jamii Esplanade – creating local arts-based experiences, St. Lawrence Market Business Improvement Association and report will be produced, prepared for on-line and printed version by me in rich visual and interactive PDF document and used for local urban improvements.

Church Street is on the west edge of **10-block "Old" town laid out in 1793** on a site selected by Lieutenant-Governor John Graves Simcoe in the eastern part of the lands reserved for government use, and in proximity to the historic St. Lawrence Market.
